


## PASTOR FACING TRIAL.

### REV. FINIS JENNINGS DAKE AT HIS HEARING IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, May 28.—Rev. Finis Jennings Dake, pastor and Bible teacher in Zion, today awaited removal to Milwaukee, Wis., where he faces trial on a charge of violating the Mann act.

Rev. Mr. Dake, who is 33, married and the father of a daughter eight years old, is accused by the government of taking Emma Barelli, 16 years old, from her home town of Kenosha, Wis., on April 23, 1935, to East St. Louis, Ill., for immoral purposes.

Dake, who is pastor of the Christian Assembly church and school supervisor of the Shiloh Bible institute at Zion, remained silent while his attorneys told U. S. Commissioner Edwin K.

Walker he would agree to be taken to Milwaukee for trial. Dake was ordered held in bonds of \$2,000.

"I did take her there," he admitted to interviewers after the hearing. "But there was no immorality involved. I wanted to get her a job."

In Zion parishioners of Rev. Mr. Dake asserted they had the "utmost confidence" in their pastor. "It's a frameup," John Erickson, a director in the church and Bible school, said. "Mr. Dake is a fine man and we are all going to stand behind him."

Dake's wife, Dorothy, who assists him in the services, has already declared her loyalty.
